Conservation in Our Schools

EACH YFAR the National Wildlife Federation, of which the Florida Wildlife Federation is an affiliate, sponsors a nation-wide conservation program. This program in 1959 was entitled, "Conservation in the Schools" and started with National Wildlife Week in March. While Wildlife Week focuses attention to conservation educa-

tion, it is hoped that particular emphasis can be directed to the subject during all of 1959 and on into succeeding years. This subject is of particular importance because, generally speaking, the resource conservation concept is not receiving adequate attention in the schools of the United States.

Conservation is a philosophy-an approach to life. The conservation concept calls for the adoption of an attitude of wise use of natural resources. While some early leaders had this approach, only in the last few years has the general public begun to become aware of the need for abandoning a policy of lavish wastefulness of soil, water, woods, and wildlife.

How can the philosophy of an entire populace be changed? The most effective means is by teaching conservation in the schools. Young people properly indoctrinated carry the conservation principles into their adult life.

In turn, many educators in teachertraining colleges first must be "converted" and sold on the importance of resource conservation. Florida is indeed fortunate in that the Governor has appointed a state-wide committee for education concerning conservation of natural assets and the Chairman of this committee is Dr. Henry Becker, Head of the Department of Geography, Florida State University.

As more and more time becomes available to the public for recreational pursuits, I am sure that we will become more and more conscious of the value of natuboys' education, would ever want to be with livelihood, has been forgotten.









WILSON McCALLISTER 6th Vice-President









Convention **Impressions**

Mr. Cecil Tindel, State President Dear Cecil:
