

As your name implies, you are the Future Farmers of America. In your hands rests the power behind all of this nation's ambitions and aspirations.


It is not with missiles and soldiers alone that we defend against the communist forces that seek to destroy us. It is in great degree with the capacity to cultivate and develop our physical environment

It is not only an army, but a nation, that marches ahead on its stomach. This is a lesson the Communist countries are learning with much difficulty. Continued crop failures throughout the Communist world, coupled with one bumper crop after another in the free world, quickly point out the superiority we hold over our adversaries today.

1963 F.F.A. Naval Stores Contest














Exhibit "Florida's Agribusiness in the Pan American Building at the State Fair," during Career Day for those in Hillsborough County.



The judges had the opportunity to view a total of 67 animals, of which they gave 24 blue ribbons to youths from all parts of the county.


The largest number of entries at the show were Jerseys with 27 registered and nine grade represented.



STEERS VALUED at \$26,565.40 were led through the auction ring at the Polk County Youth Fair at Bartow on March 8 to end the cattle activities at the three day event. Each of the 72 steers sold for 40 cents or more as bids came to auctioneer Bob Cooper of Sarasota from 52 different buyers.








Grand champion Angus bull was this entry shown by Terry Ogburn of Frost-







Several FFA Chapters Receive Award

THE LEE Chapter, Live Oak FFA Federation (The Suwannee and J. F. Williams Chapters), and the Inverness Chapter were approved to receive the Improving Agriculture and Leadership Award sponsored by the Future Farmers of America Foundation. The \$713.73 was divided in three ways among the above chapters.

The Turkey Creek Chapter will use the money to help them purchase and install an irrigation system on the land laboratory plot.

The Wauchula (Peace River) FFA Chapter will use their money in helping them to erect and equip a propagating shed.

The above projects were approved because it was felt that they would assist FFA Chapters and members in demonstrating improved practices that they felt were needed in the community.
