Atlanta Hosts Southern Safety Conference



The Road to Success



1964 F.F.A. Naval Stores Award















Forestry Field Day Feature Events For Many Florida Chapters

FUTURE FARMERS of America from 35 north and central Florida chapters strove hard to bring recognition and money to their individual chapters at four separate forestry competitions during the past

The Forestry Field Days, held near Gainesville, Madison, and also at Blackwater River State Forest and Torreya State Park, offered a number of events for team entries and individual contestants. Field day activities and contest rules were worked out jointly by the Florida Forest Service, vo-ag advisers. and forest industry representatives. Cash awards for individuals and chapter teams were made available by St. Regis Paper Co., International Paper Co., Rayonier, Inc., and the Buckeye Cellulose Corporation.

Each field day consisted of five contests: estimating pulpwood and sawtimber volume from standing trees, estimating heights and diameters, land measuring, log sawing, and log rolling. Each chapter selected a forestry team of no more than four students, and could enter no more than two boys in a single contest. Contest winners were judged on total point scores. The field days helped to stimulate interest in conservation, and in the importance of Florida's forest resources.





The National FFA Magazine Committee at the National Convention, suggested that each delegate take back to their State Convention the proposal that in the future, State dues, National dues, and the subscription to the National Future Farmer Magazine, be collected together and that each member who pays State and National dues be expected to subscribe to the magazine. The committee also suggested that the State Conventions take action this next year on the proposal that the publication of the magazine be increased from six issues per year to ten issues as soon as possible. The committee requested that the delegates present these items to their respective states for discussion and action at their State Convention and that their state delegates to the 1964 National Convention, be instructed to vote according to the State's wishes on the above recommended changes.

FFA Chapter delegates should come to the State FFA Convention prepared to discuss and vote on this proposal.






