By Way of Editorial Comment:

Farming in a Decline?

Many people today deplore the passing of what we like to call our agrarian American culture. The decline of farming as a way of life that predominated in shaping the culture of our Nation arouses many nostalgic responses. The self-contained, self-sufficient farm where the family was both the social and economic unit; the farm community where common needs developed true neighborliness; the closeness to Nature which demanded respect and inspired awe and appreciation—many of these precious heritages of rural America have all but vanished from the scene.

Thanks to scientific and technological advances, agriculture has become a well-organized business operation. The size of farms has necessarily increased. The number of farmers in relation to the total population has correspondingly decreased. Fewer farmers are required to produce enough food and fiber for our people with surpluses that continue to cause us concern.

With the great increases in the production of the basic necessities of life we can find no fault. But for every advance a price must be paid. Farming throughout the ages has, indeed, meant more than the mere production of commodities. As a necessary way of life its contributions to the human good amounted to much more than the fruits of the soil. It also produced people; people with sturdy char-

acter who greatly desired freedom and who knew how to use it.

It does not appear that we have yet found the social and spiritual counterparts of the scientific and technological

advances that have been made in recent years. Suburbia, to which so many of our rural farm folk have migrated, has not deevloped the fine human solidarity of the earlier farm community. Certainly, our industrial urban centers have not produced the opportunity for our youth to learn how to work and to share responsibility as was the case with the farm youth of another generation.

Because of these conditions there is every reason for those who are responsible for the program of the Future Farmers of America to redouble their efforts to achieve their stated goals. Those who are farmers must be better farmers; not just better producers, but better citizens, better business men, better social, spiritual and political leaders. Our ideal must be that everyone who dedicates himself to a life devoted to the business of agriculture should be worthy at all times to be addressed as "Mister Farmer."




















