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









Dale Boyett Is Star Farmer

WAYNE DALE BOYETT, 18, of the Groveland FFA Chapter was named Star State Farmer June 12 by the Florida Association, Future Farmers of America, during the 41st Annual State FFA Convention in Daytona Beach. Pictured above is Dale with his Mother and chapter advisors.

The son of Mrs. Veretha L. Boyett of Route 1. Groveland, Dale was recently graduated from Groveland High School where his advisers were Freddie Garner and Robert A. Campbell.

Dale's receiving the outstanding award was based on the merit of his supervised experience projects, including livestock, citrus, and grain. When Dale had organized his program and seemed to be making systematic progress, his father was stricken suddenly and died. This left Dale, his mother, two brothers and two sisters in extreme circumstance.

Dale's first thought was not only to forsake his vocational agriculture activities but to drop out of school to work more closely in the management of the family farm. His FFA adviser, Freddie Garner, dissuaded him, and Dale resolved to finish school.

Within sixty days, however, it was necessary to sell his hogs and beef cattle. Again it appeared that Dale would not be able to continue. Again his counselor stood by explaining that FFA leaders don't quit. Starting once again at virtual zero, his first projects liquidated, Dale started over.

Dale's new enterprise was citrus. It was necessary for him, in order to get a good return from the five-acre grove which he inherited from his father's estate, to learn citrus management quickly. Dale learned use and maintenance of the spray equipment, and he mastered management techniques in record time. He assisted his mother and

his invalid brother in the management of their 15 acres and was able to assure them a respectable yield and market return.

Continuing to counsel with his adviser, Dale was able to add to his citrus production a pasture project, beef finishing operation and a corn project.

During the two-year period when Dale was following through with production and marketing, he lent an active hand in farm maintenance. This included repairing and improving fences and gates, equipment repair and maintenance, and routine work on two farm buildings.

Other work was in pruning trees, fertilizing. propagating planting stock, and raising selected ornamentals for market. Dale learned how to inoculate cattle and hogs and how to apply fungicides, herbicides, and insecticides.

During the 1968-69 school year, Dale was named president of his chapter, having served as vice president during the preceding year. A recognized leader, he is a good public speaker, and represented his chapter at the National FFA Convention one year ago. He has served as a delegate to the State Convention, attended the State Leadership Conference and acted as chairman for his parliamentary procedure team. Moreover he has taken part in beef, land, and citrus judging competition. His interests include forestry, quartet singing, and promotion of booster programs for Radio and TV.

DARRYL TOWNSEND



The National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA) says the typical day's menu included a breakfast of peaches, bacon squares, strawberry cubes, a grape drink and an orange drink.

Lunch included beef and potatoes in a wet pack, butterscotch pudding, brownies and grape punch. The dinner packet consisted of salmon salad, chicken and rice in a spoon bowl, sugar cookie cubes, cocoa and a pineapple drink.

A NASA spokesman said most

of the foods required special preparation with cold or hot water on board the Command and Lunar Modules. Not tomorrow, but in the not-too-distant future, the spokesman said space vehicles will carry meals like TV dinners which will be easily warmed in a radar-type

While the homemaker will not quickly accept or avail herself of these innovations, her kitchen of the future may just have one of those ovens; and quicker than you say Thanksgiving, she'll have her meal ready.

These new developments could never have been imagined by Priscilla, the Pilgrim beauty, as she helped John Alden roast clams during the first Thanksgiving. The modern day homemaker marvels at these space food innovations, knowing that food must meet the appetite, satisfy hunger, be familiar in sight, smell and taste to her family. For now, only the earth-bound Thanksgiving custom and meal will provide these criteria.

So from where there's plenty and from where man made his first trip out of an earthly environ to another planet, the homemaker will find all she needs for this earthly Thanksgiving Day menu suggestion.
