

# Be A Good Presiding Officer

"Actions speak louder than words." How you walk, how you stand, how you control your emotions, and last, but not least, your personal appearance are all contributing factors and are most important in becoming a good presiding officer.

### You Must Be Able To Think

Most errors that are made before an audience can be easily prevented by thinking. The good Lord gave us a head on our shoulders for many uses but the most important of these, is that we may think. Nothing sets a person aside as a capable leader more than his demonstrating that his ideas and convictions are based on serious and logical thinking. If you will seek, you can find many aids and references (in the library) on how to improve your ability to think. You must work at it.

### You Must Be Adjustable

The routine of events seldom happen as planned, so it's impossible to memorize a set of routine procedure for all situations. Be able to capitalize on sudden changes. Stress the advantages and values of sudden changes rather than making excuses. A good leader will seldom use excuses. Tackle assignments with "gusto" rather than hesitation.

### Know Your Group

Always recognize that only a few people know as much about your organization or its business that you are about to transact, as you do. Assume that others are thirsty for a better understanding about your group and the workings of your program. Never fail to inform your audience about your organization and what it is attempting to do. Be a good salesman before every group on every item of business. Don't take for granted any item of business. If you don't show some enthusiasm others won't either. Often your own members need their morale boosted.

# Know the Importance of Sincere, Mature Courtesy

Recognize superiors. Age is to be respected even with close friends. You can have the satisfying and happy privilege of leading adults, including "IMPORTANT" people, by your displaying humility of self and high esteem of others.

### Remaining Silent

Recognize controversial issues. Exercise the right to express your views with caution. Over-exuberance sometimes injures you more than someone else. A good leader controls his emotions to the extent that he is so convincing that apparently his only desire is to help others.

### Acquaint Yourself With Parliamentary Law

It is important if you are an officer to set an example for others to follow. If you use improper parliamentary procedure, it is a glaring social error and extremely bad taste. You may have all the traits of the best leaders, but there are too many simple outlines on good parliamentary practice for you to display ignorance on the subject. All of which means that you have to constantly STUDY.

Communicate the Good and Bad


Never neglect the undesirable at
the expense of the good in any issue. Be fair minded on both sides
of an issue. The "goods" "never

of an issue. The "goals," "purposes" and "objectives" of your organization are nothing more than you, its leader. As you preside, to display undue pressure adversely reflects on each member of your group, both in the local organization and in the national organization if you have one.

# You Have A Binding Obligation

Never slack up until every duty has been fulfilled—a slacker is a "poor officer." Attend all meetings and be on time. To be an officer it becomes necessary to sacrifice things you would like to do in order to fulfill your official duty. Sometimes it will mean foregoing a trip with the family or friends. It might mean breaking an important date or not attending a good show. When you accepted your office, you silently and publicly agreed not to let these things interfere with the duties of your office. If you didn't, you gave your members a false impression. Just remember, a successful officer always finds time to have his recreation and still serve his office well. This indicates how big he is.

Exemplify A Generous Attitude
You "MUST" realize that your




# Officer Candidates Interviewed on Monday

















For the past 20 years agricultural workers have been leaving the farms and crowding into the cities looking for jobs which were non-existent or for which they were unprepared.

They had neither the land nor the money to be farmers themselves and they could see little profit in farming, even though prices were subsidized and the government was paying farmers to take land out of production.

The growth of population at home and the need for feeding more people overseas is changing all this. Even the machines need someone to operate them. Every farmer, however big he may be, needs experts in soils, nutrition, botany and agronomy to advise him. Farming has become big business, grown far beyond the land owner and his sons and offering jobs for a rapidly growing number of skilled workers.


"As students in vocational agricure, you are in for some exciting days," Doyle Conner. Florida's commissioner of agriculture, told members of the Future Farmers of America the other day. "I believe in the future of agriculture, with a faith born not of words but of deeds, achievements won by the present and past generations of agriculture; in the promise of better days through better ways, even as the better things we now enjoy have come to us from the struggles of former years."

One thing about it, people have to eat and there is a growing number of mouths that have to be fed, and the American farmer has been the most progressive in the world, using the most advanced technologies to produce more food and fiber per acre of land with less manual labor and at less cost.

Today's farmer is no longer the man with a hoe or one who walks behind a plow.

He is the skilled mechanic who keeps the machines working, the scientist with his test tubes seeking ways to kill nematodes or plant pests without pollution.

# PESTICIDES HAVE MADE AND ARE MAKING A SUBSTANTIAL CONTRIBUTION TO MANKIND!

THE EFFECTIVE and discriminate use of pesticides contributes greatly to man's health and well-being by promoting insect and disease control and increasing food production.

Health officials have credited the use of just one insecticide with saving 5 million lives and preventing 100 million illnesses covering the short period during and immediately after World War II.

More progress in food production has been made in the past 30 years than all previous years of man's history. One farm worker in 1940 produced enough food and fiber for himself and nine others. Today he produces enough for himself and 41 other people. A recent report of the Food and Agricultural Organization of the U. N. states that the single most important thing underdeveloped countries can do to increase needed food production is to expand the proper use of pesticides.

Since the introduction of synthetic organic pesticides, big game populations have held their own or increased substantially. Game birds, small animals, and fish production have all shown gains despite heavy pressures from sportsmen and urban expansion.

The indiscriminate and improper use of pesticides is wrong, but the condemnation of all pesticides as being injurious to man and his environment is an even greater wrong.


