Twelve Florida FFA members have been recommended by the National FFA Board of Directors to receive the American Farmer Degree. The American Farmer Degree is the highest degree of membership presented by the youth organization for students of vocational agriculture. It will be presented during the National FFA Convention held in Kansas City, Missouri, October 11-13.

The Board of Directors and the National Officers reviewed the Florida applications for the American Farmer Degree and jointly agreed to recommend that convention delegates approve the 13 candidates. Approval by these Boards usually means that the candidates will be confirmed by the delegates.

The 12 FFA members were among 471 FFA members throughout the nation recommended for the American Farmer Degree. The degree is presented to approximately one FFA member in a thousand in any given year.

presented a certificate and gold key from the FFA organization, plus a cash travel allowance to the National Convention from the National FFA Foundation, Inc.

FFA members are eligible for the American Farmer Degree after having earned the State Farmer Degree in their state. They must have been an active member of the FFA continuously for at least three years and have a record of participation in the activities of the local chapter and state association.

In addition the FFA member must have earned at least \$1,000 by his or her own efforts from a supervised farming or other agricultural occupational experience program. The money he or she earned must be productively invested or deposited in a bank. The degree is presented only to FFA members who have demonstrated their leadership and scholarship ability during high school and who are showing evidence of becoming successfully established in an agricultural occupation.





The day long contest included identification of seeds, Irish potato defects, insects, nutrient deficiencies, vegetables diseases, weeds, potato grades, varieties and kinds of vegetables, fruits and horticulture plants, and judging of fresh raw vegetables for quality and condition.






Area V — Kenneth Davidson, of the Moore Haven FFA Chapter.



















Constitutional Change

A change in the State Constitution was proposed by the Crescent City Chapter about a month before the State Convention. The change was presented to and considered by the delegates. The change was passed. The change reads as follows:

Article VIII, Section F-The State officers, for any given year, must be elected from the High School Graduating class, of the group receiving the State Farmer Degree, and/or from the group who received their State Farmer Degrees as juniors the preceding year.

A member is eligible to run for office only one year.






The beautiful Miss Sunflavor, Terri Ann Richard, added spice to the evening session.

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
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Convention



(4) There are several special features: a drenching pully, leg catching hook, and a rocking tail gate with off-center spring which holds it both open and shut, but requires no latches.




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12,000 Florida **Future Farmers** Will Read This 1972 Report of the 44th Annual Convention

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
