




New Chapters Chartered







Chris Hardee, candidate for state office, delivers his campaign speech while other candidates wait for their chance to talk to the delegates.







With the tremendous number of acci-


dents that occur around us each day, we can see why the FFA places major emphasis in the fields of safety and accident prevention.





Star Agribusinessman

Building equity in the family owned and operated custom meat cutting operation is the goal of Phil Redditt of Orlando, Florida, the recently named Southern Region Star Agribusinessman. One of seven children of Mr. and Mrs. B.W. Redditt, Phil set his career goal while he was enrolled in vocational agriculture at Colonial High School in Orlando.

Redditt admits to being influenced in his decision to enroll in the high school vocational agriculture and FFA programs by two older brothers, both of whom were active FFA members. "In 1968 my dream came true when I enrolled in vocational agriculture at Union Park Junior High School and ioined the FFA," says Redditt. As an FFA member Redditt took every opportunity to participate in FFA activities. He was Chapter Treasurer for two years and later was elected vice president. Redditt says FFA leadership training has been a big help to him as a supervisor in the family owned custom meat business.

Redditt began his supervised experience program in vocational agriculture in 1968 when he started working in the family meat packing business. "I started as a wrapper," says Redditt recalling how he began

his work experience at the bottom and worked up in the business. But soon Redditt was working elsewhere in the plant as a meat cutter and at other jobs. Three years later, in 1971, Phil Redditt was given responsibility for maintaining the freezer inventory, handling storage billing to customers, and making sure that the various cuts of meat were not overstocked.

Now nearly seven years since he began his training program Reddick has experience and skill in all phases of the meats operation. His main responsibilities now include handling retail sales, ordering supplies of boxes, seasoning, cleaning, and wrapping materials and doing light maintenance on machinery and equipment.

Since his employment at Redditt's Custom Meats, the business has continued to grow. He has added several innovations to the business such as increasing profits by selling meat byproducts as pet food. Slaughter has been expanded from one to three days a week and machinery is now on a regular maintenance schedule.

"FFA livestock and meat judging experience has been invaluable in preparing for a career in the livestock industry," says Redditt. The Orlando Livestock Judging Team on which Redditt was a member for four years won several contests in Florida and participated in the National Livestock Judging Contest in Kansas City, Missouri, in 1972. Redditt also thinks the record keeping skills he learned in the FFA have been extremely helpful in his advancement in the business.





One of seven children of Mr. and Mrs. B.W. Redditt, Phil set his career goal while he was enrolled in vocational agriculture at Colonial High School in Orlando.

Redditt admits to being influenced in his decision to enroll in the high school vocational agriculture and FFA programs by two older brothers, both of whom were active FFA members. "In 1968 my dream came true when I enrolled in vocational agriculture at Union Park Junior High School and joined the FFA," says Redditt. As an FFA member Redditt took every opportunity to participate in FFA activities. He was Chapter Treasurer for two years and later was elected vice president. Redditt says FFA leadership training has been a big help to him as a supervisor in the family owned custom meat business.

Redditt began his supervised experience program in vocational agriculture in 1968 when he started working in the family meat packing business. "I started as a wrapper," says Redditt recalling how he began

his work experience at the bottom and worked up in the business. But soon Redditt was working elsewhere in the plant as a meat cutter and at other jobs. Three years later, in 1971, Phil Redditt was given responsibility for maintaining the freezer inventory, handling storage billing to customers, and making sure that the various cuts of meat were not overstocked.

Now nearly seven years since he began his training program Reddick has experience and skill in all phases of the meats operation. His main responsibilities now include handling retail sales, ordering supplies of boxes, seasoning, cleaning, and wrapping materials and doing light maintenance on machinery and equipment.

Since his employment at Redditt's Custom Meats, the business has continued to grow. He has added several innovations to the business such as increasing profits by selling meat by-products as pet food. Slaughter has been expanded from one to three days a week and machinery is now on a regular maintenance schedule.

"FFA livestock and meat judging experience has been invaluable in preparing for a career in the livestock industry," says Redditt. The Orlando Livestock Judging Team on which Redditt was a member for four years won several contests in Florida and participated in the National Livestock Judging Contest in Kansas City, Missouri, in 1972. Redditt also thinks the record keeping skills he learned in the FFA have been extremely helpful in his advancement in the business.
