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

In accepting the challenge, Conner said his goal is to raise \$4.4 million.

Conner, a former State and National FFA President said he hopes to raise the money in the near future. "We will be calling on businesses and industries all across the state. The sooner we raise the money, the sooner Future Farmers will be able to enjoy the facilities in Polk County."

DEED SIGNED FOR TRAINING CENTER

The deed has been signed, the plans have been finalized and the drive is on to raise \$4.4 million to build a State FFA Leadership Training Center in Lakeland.

"The FFA has touched the life of almost everyone in the State," said Florida Commissioner of Agriculture Doyle Conner who is serving as Chairman of the fund raising drive. This Leadership Training Center will enable the Future Farmers of America to grow and will provide an excellent training ground for Florida's future leaders."

The land for the site, 200 acres near

Lakeland, was given to the FFA by International Minerals and Chemical Corporation of Mulberry.

"The gift from International Minerals and Chemical Corporation enabled us to locate the Center in the heart of Florida, near most of the FFA members in the State," said Conner.

"The cost of the Center will be approximately \$3.5 million," said Conner, a former State and National FFA President. The remainder of the money will be placed in a special endowment fund which will provide for operation of the Center on a continual basis.

"We have already started the drive and will be calling on business and industry all across the State to help in this effort. In addition, we expect FFA Chapters in the State to raise at least \$500,000 of the total."

State FFA President Chuck Duggar enthusiastically accepted Conner's challenge.

"FFA members across the State will be organizing fund raising activities soon," said Duggar. We realize the significence of a Leadership Training Center and are prepared to do our part to make this a reality.

Conner said the primary purpose of the Center will be to provide educational and recreational facilities for FFA members and teachers of vocational agriculture.

When completed, the Center will serve as a statewide educational facility for Florida's 15,000 FFA members and teachers of vocational agriculture. The facility will accommodate up to 350 students at one time for a variety of meetings, conferences, workshops, leadership schools and contests.

- Schedule event far enough in advance to properly prepare for the occasion
- Utilize sample news release provided for newspaper coverage.
- Utilize sample spot announcement for radio coverage
- Determine whether the funds should be channeled through school account or mailed directly to the Florida FFA Foundation
- For tax deductible purposes, the donor may want to mail a contribution directly to Florida FFA Foundation
- When contributions or proceeds are mailed to the Florida FFA Foundation, it is up to the Chapter to enclose

The task for FFA members in the fund raising drive is simple, yet necessary. A new program is appropriately named Hire-An-Aggie. Formulated at a brainstrorming session by FFA members and endorsed by Commissioner Conner, the Hire-An-Aggie Program is rapidly growing into a statewide venture that is serving two major purposes - providing much needed labor for activities in the community and providing funds for construction of the LTC.

FFA members may participate in the Hire-An-Aggie Program by obtaining a brochure from their Chapter Advisor and reading it carefully. Once they feel confident with the workings of the program, members are encouraged to go into their community and work a day for the LTC. The salary that the members earn will be forwarded directly to the Foundation by the employer and placed in the LTC Building Fund.

This new program should help demonstrate to the members of local communities that the future of American agriculture is in good hands.


FRM CHAPTER LIVESTOCK AWARDS



CROP PRODUCTION PROFICIENCY

Reggie Crutchfield, a 17-year old student in the Grand Ridge High School vocational agriculture program was the 1981 state winner of the Florida FFA Crop Production Proficiency Award. Reggie, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Billy Crutchfield, was named for the award on the basis of his practical application of skills and training gained while in school. As the State Winner, Reggie received a plaque from DoLime Minerals Co., the state sponsor, and a \$100 check from Massey Ferguson, the national sponsor.

For Reggie, winning the Proficiency Award in Crop Production is the culmination of three years of on-the-job training with his father. Some of the more important aspects of his training have been interpreting soil test reports, maintaining farm equipment, using subsoiler to increase root growth, indentifying insects, using improved varieties to increase yield, maintaining records, and developing a crop rotation plan. Reggie plans to put these skills to good use as a crop farmer.

Reggie was a member of the Livestock Judging Team, Forestry and Agriculture Mechanics Team. He was also a member of Beta Club, Science Club, and listed in Who's Who Among American High School Students.







There were three judges for this FFA contest and the finalists competed on stage during a general session of the State FFA Convention.



The Bunnell FFA Chapter is the 1981 state winner of the Building Our American Communities Awards Program. Bunnell received state recognition and the Governor's citation at the 1981 state convention. BOAC Awards are given to chapters who contribute to the betterment of their local communities.

The BOAC project of the Bunnell Chapter is designed to stop sand erosion that threatened Flagler Beach and could have destroyed a nearby highway. The 90 members of the chapter are planting tough, salt-resistant grasses along the 18 miles of beach. The chapter started the three-year plan to save the dunes last summer.

Bunnell FFA members worked hard for their Gold Emblem Chapter Award, as did the Santa Fe Senior, Sarasota Junior and Lake Weir Senior chapters, who also competed.




DAIRY JUDGING CONTEST

It is rumored that Kevin does not sleep, "It's too boring, I like to be doing something."

Kevin's predecessor, whose accomplishments were nearly as numerous as Kevin's, is a student at the University of Florida. Kevin is a Pre-med student at the University of South Florida.

Kathryn Rowe sends this news: The Land O'Lakes Senior Chapter of the Future Farmers of America recently held the election of officers for the 1981-82 school year. The President is Wayne Naylor; Vice President, James Jenkins; Secretary, Cassandra McGee. Other officers are: Treasurer, Flint Seth; Reporter, Kathryn Rowe; Sentinel, John Lawrence and Chaplain, Dennis Jones. The 1981-82 Advisors are Mr. Raymond Campbell and Mr. Wayne Willingham.

The year's activities for the chapter have been outlined. They will include: the raising of a chapter steer named "Rebel," raising of a chapter hog named "Bocephus," participating in the Citrus Judging Contest, Dairy Judging Contest, and the Florida State Fair.

Saving the most unusual for last we have a letter from Milton Galvez, Agriculture Instructor at the Sarasota Country Vocational-Technical Center, to share. Mr. Galvez spent a portion of the summer in Panama, working with the Future Farmers of Panama. He explains the program:

The program involved the training of Panamanian educators, provisions for teaching resources and creation of a \$110,000.00 credit fund. The credit fund provides loans to Future Farmers of Panama chapters throughout the country to finance productive enterprises. These productive enterprises range from lifestock projects involving fattening or breeding of hogs, rabbits or poultry, to crops of rice, corn or vegetables. Bee hives are also popular chapter projects financed through these loans.

The largest loan so far given to a Future Farmers of Panama chapter amounted to \$10,000. The smallest loan amounted to \$450. The rate of interest for the loans is 7 per cent. The money is loaned for periods that vary from 6 months to several years, depending on the nature of the project. As loans are repaid, the money goes back into the credit fund and becomes available for other loans.

In addition, purebred hogs donated by organizations in the U.S. are used in a sort of national pig bank. Chapters receiving the purebred pigs pay back by returning a number of offspring from the first litter produced. These in turn become available to other chapters under the same terms.

Under similar arrangements, various

vocational agriculture programs have obtained goats, rabbits and bee hives. This has resulted in widespread dissemination of superior stock to school farms throughout the country. In time, this superior stock will help improve the livestock of individual farmers.

The international exchange between FFA and its counterpart in Panama has yielded fruitful results. The impact of this exchange on the vocational agriculture program and Future Farmers' Chapter at a school called San Benito was especially remarkable.

The San Benito school is located in a picturesque village on the slope of Mount Baru, a volcano and Panama's highest mountain. The American participants in FFA exchange that visited San Benito, were a poultry science major, and a graduate who had majored in nutrition. They jointly prepared a feasibility study and assisted the school in organizing a turkey production project. The turkey chicks were flown in from Canada and were sold eventually as 14 pounders, dressed and smoked. A Swiss, who operates a nearby packing plant, advised in the smoking process. The 300 turkeys netted a profit of \$1200. Then the school sent its vocational agriculture teacher to the U.S., to work for one month in a turkey farm, in order to gain additional experience in turkey production. A second turkey project is now in progress in San Benito and is moving along as well as the first one.

Other FFA representatives participating in the international exchange helped organize new Future Farmers of Panama chapters. Also, they assisted in the organization of contests dealing with agricultural skills.

The funds contributed by the U.S.A. Agency for International Development were channeled through a private group of Panamanian businessmen, organized into a foundation to assist Panama's rural youth.

A major concern in the development of this aid project has always been to secure efficient use of the money spent and to avoid creating dependency. It's success demonstrates the dynamic and creative virtues of free enterprise.

Four years ago when I first visited Panama to develop this project, I realized that it would take the cooperation of many participants to implement it. It was most gratifying to find out, during this trip to evaluate the results, that these expectations were met.
