










CHAPTERS WITH OUTSTANDING SAE PROGRAMS





RETIRING ADDRESSES

ANNE-KATHRYN DANIEL

President 1989-90

The higher you build your barriers, the taller I become.

The more you take my rights away, the faster I will run.

The more you refuse to hear my voice, the louder I will sing.

Although you may have done me wrong, there's still something inside so strong.

The first time I heard these words, I was sitting on the steps of the Lincoln Memorial in our nation's capital, listening to our national officers. It was a magical evening. I was surrounded by the state officers from across the country, the new friends I had made. As I sat listening to that song, I began to think. I realized that strength was the essential ingredient in a person's life and because I was starting my year, I made myself a promise. This year I would look for strength — in myself, in others, in our industry and in our organization. I would figure out which strengths I needed and I felt once I knew, then I would have the answer to the universe.

It didn't take me long to find strength from the members I met, and it wasn't long before I realized that a person's character is like a long chain and each link is made up of different strengths. So I tried to figure out which links were the most important ones. Which ones did I need to cultivate and add to my own personal chain? Once again I turned to the FFA members. One thing I saw more than anything this year was courage. It is a very scary thing to run for an office or enter a contest. You put yourself on the line, leaving yourself wide open for judgment and rejection. This year I have watched countless members competing - winning and losing. I have watched as they rejoiced as their name was called and others biting their lip, trying not to cry, when theirs was not. I have watched as they picked themselves up, brushed themselves off and said, "Yes, it WAS worth it," and they tried again, more determined and courageous than ever.

Another thing I witnessed was FFA members refusing to be classified or stereotyped. It takes courage to stand up for what you really believe in, especially if it is not the most popular thing to do or say. I have watched FFA

members stand up for their views, whether they were expressing their views on animal rights, saving the planet or fighting for an industry. And while their opinions may not have been the most popular thing to do or say, they still found the courage to express them and, more importantly, to do something about them. I am reminded of one of my favorite Robert Fulgum stories.

It seems a Sunday School teacher had taken on the almost impossible task of herding 35 kindergartners into playing a game. The game was a Medieval-type game requiring the children to choose one of three categories in which to become. The children could become a dragon, giant or wizard. The teacher explained the rules and shouted, "On the count of three you must decide which category you fit in — dragons, giants or wizards." He clapped his hands, the children scattered, shrieking wildly, and ran off to choose a group. The teacher watched them amusedly as they changed their minds and raced off to join yet another group. He felt a small tug on his pants leg and turned to see a small girl who looked up and asked in a concerned voice, "But where do the mermaids stand?" He replied, "But there are no such things as mermaids." "Yes, there are," she insisted, "I am one." She did not identify with becoming a dragon, giant or wizard — she knew her place. She was a mermaid. And she did not intend to stand in the corner with the losers. She intended to participate wherever mermaids fit into the scheme of things. Well, where do the mermaids stand? All of those who are different, who do not quite fit the norm and refuse to be classified? Answer that question and you can create a country.

This year I have met those who had the courage to realize they didn't quite fit in, those who searched for the confidence to form their own groups. This year I searched for the link courage to add to my chain. I realized for the first time that courage is not a matter of convenience. It is a matter of sacrifice.

As I continued to journey through my year I notice one thing as I met countless successful people. Each one that I met, whether they were industry people, advisors or parents, all had one thing in common: they all believed in themselves and what they were doing.

Conviction is such an important quality, essential to success. A person has to believe in what they are doing to do it well. I've met members this year who believed in the future of FFA and agriculture at times I question them myself. Conviction is a quality that I have tried to instill in myself and recognize readily in others. And it is also an important link to my chain.

My final link of strength is my strongest and most important one. My final link is faith in God and Jesus Christ. I have prayed this year more than any other year of my life — for my officer team, for understanding and for strength in the situations I encountered. I could feel your prayers also each time I got on and off the interstate. headed home or started on a brand-new journey. I felt them all during the 40,000 miles I traveled this year. Like a warm blanket, the prayers of my church, friends and family have enveloped me and God's presence has kept me safe.

Courage, conviction and faith in God are just a few links in my chain, which I am constantly adding and changing, and no two persons will ever have chains which are the same — everyone must develop their own. The personal chains that I have had the privilege of witnessing this year were remarkable.

At age 19 I don't pretend to know all the answers. In fact, at this stage of my life I am just beginning to ask the right questions. In a 10-minute speech I can't imagine to spout enough wisdom to radically change the universe, redefine socioeconomic lines or alter each life here this evening. But I do hope that in the course of my year I have touched a few, because you have certainly changed me forever. Thank you for always making me feel good about me each time I was with you.

May the road rise up to meet you, May the wind be always at your back. May the rains fall gently upon your ace,

Softly upon your fields.

And until we meet again, may God hold you

Safely in the palm of His hand. FFA members, it has been my greatest honor to serve you.


